This winter has been amazing with attending six different MD5M midwinter conventions. Entertainment from blackjack tournaments to bands of The White Sidewalls, Wreckless and the Rain Kings. Not only do you gain new ideas and a creative way of doing things, but you meet old friends and gain new ones.

I would thoroughly encourage all to grow AND have fun, by attending the: Emerging Lions Leadership Institute (April 13 -16), the Multiple District Convention (May 5-7) and the Lions International Convention (July 7-11, 2023). You can see and feel how Lions working together can make a difference in their communities and the world.

I want to thank you for what you do and the 22 out of 34 clubs that are reporting their hard-working volunteer hours, donated funds and service activities. As of this date, District 5M6 has 24,866 volunteer hours, 1,149 service activities and donated funds of \$863,122.

You are incredible. If your club needs assistance in reporting, please let me know. We would be amazed at the numbers, if all clubs reported their activities by June 30th this year.

Our membership is gaining momentum. We have added 85 new Lions, dropped 69 with a total of 1285.

How can your club be strengthened? Lion Kim McRunnel has had two sessions for the district on the Global Membership Approach.

The Global Membership Approach, also referred to as GMA, is a standard business process that will help your clubs build for the future by defining, where they are now, where they want to be and how they will get there. All of this working toward the ultimate goals of increasing their service, increasing the joy of being a Lion and growing their membership. The GMA process includes **Building a Team**; **Building a Vision**; **Building a Plan**; and **Building Success** by using tools like SWOT, SMART Goals and Action Plans.

As a process, it is ongoing. So, your clubs will **Implement, Monitor, Adjust, Succeed, Celebrate and Repeat**.

Continuous communication is key to GMA's success. That means communicating achievements and struggles so that the entire club knows where the club stands on goal attainment. This will also help to keep the excitement/enthusiasm going. GMA is working well in other districts.

Lions in Turkey Provide Earthquake Relief Through LCIF

When a powerful earthquake hit Turkey and Syria on Feb. 5, homes crumbled to the ground, hundreds of other buildings collapsed, thousands of lives were lost, tens of thousands of people were displaced, and communities were changed forever.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) quickly responded to empower their service by awarding a \$200,000 Major Catastrophe Grant to Lions in Turkey. Grant funds will enable Lions to provide immediate, short- and long-term relief to victims of one of the largest earthquakes to hit the region in more than 100 years.



Integrating Breeze into his Life was a Breeze for Ridge

Ridge knows the drill. As a successor client, Ridge's history with service dogs is extensive. Breeze is his third dog from Can Do Canines since becoming a client in 2006, and he trained a couple of dogs prior to that on his own. Despite having faced premature retirement with his 2019 Mobility and Hearing Assist Dog, Peggy, Ridge kept his heart open and ready to embrace a new partner.

This summer, he was paired with Breeze, and says, "She is just perfect for me ... She makes me be a better person." Ridge has Multiple Sclerosis, hearing loss, and vision issues, so Breeze had big paws to fill in learning a variety of skills. Ridge says, "I drop things a lot, including my guide cane. I always drop that." Whether Breeze is picking up dropped items, tugging open doors, or alerting Ridge to different sounds, she allows Ridge to have a more independent life. "I don't have to depend on other people," he states.

Wearing a patch on one eye, Ridge also relies a bit on Breeze's vision. He explains that when they are out and about, he uses his guide cane but says, "She will show me where curbs are at and changes in elevation, you know, things like that. She will step up on them or stop at them." He is also familiarizing her with the elevators at Mayo Clinic, where he regularly goes for appointments. When they are waiting at the bank of six elevators and they hear a signal that one has arrived, he asks Breeze, "Show me," so she can direct Ridge to the correct one.

Breeze's energy level matches well with Ridge's lifestyle. Though they enjoy going on walks and playing indoors, she has a mellow personality overall. "Breeze loves to cuddle all the time, and I like that," Ridge admits.

Being able to share life with an assistance dog like her is, well ... a Breeze, and Ridge definitely appreciates it. He says, "There are really no words that I can say to say 'thank you.' There are no words to express how I feel. Losing my vision and hearing, I cannot train my own dogs anymore. I just don't have the ability, and without Can Do Canines, I wouldn't be able to. I wouldn't have the independence without Breeze. I ... I ... There aren't words."

As I have traveled this last couple of months with club visits and district conventions, I am always overwhelmed with the generosity of Lions and their clubs. This contest is a wonderful opportunity for your club to work with youth in your community to promote peace, tolerance and international understanding. It encourages young people, ages 11 to 13, to think about peace, creatively express what it means to them and share their unique visions with the world.

6 EASY STEPS TO A SUCCESSFUL CONTEST

1. Connect with Your School or Youth Group

Get in touch with an area school or organized, sponsored youth group early to allow enough time for planning. Once you have confirmed their participation:

- Provide the school or youth group contact with the Official School or Youth Group Contest Guide & Rules. Add your Peace Poster Contest chairperson's name and phone number in the spaces provided.
- Let the school and/or youth group contact know that you and your club are there to help!

Expand your contest! Involve your club members in identifying schools and youth groups to participate in the contest. Your club can sponsor more than one school or youth group—or multiple contests within the same school or youth group (i.e., one per grade level)—but a Peace Poster Contest kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored.

To place your order for Peace Poster Contest Kits, visit the LCI Store at shop.lionsclubs.org and Search "Peace Poster Kit." The price is \$11.95 USD each. Kits are available from January 15 to October 1.

2. Notify Your District Governor of Your Club's Participation

Email or call your club's district governor immediately to let them know that your club is participating in the contest. Be sure to confirm the deadline dates and when the district judging will be held.

3. Arrange Contest Judging

Discuss how the judging will be handled with your school or youth group contact. Work together to identify an individual, such as the school principal, youth group leader, local artist, club representative or a panel of judges to select one winning poster for each contest sponsored by your club.

Judges are asked to evaluate posters on three criteria: originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme, "Dare to Dream."

Posters selected to advance to the next level of judging must meet all the requirements as outlined in the Contest Rules & Conditions. Posters not meeting these specifications will be disqualified.

4. Advance Your Club's Winning Poster to the Next Level of Judging

After the winning poster is selected, forward it on to the next level of judging. If your club has sponsored multiple contests, you need to advance one winning poster for each contest (per kit purchased).

- Complete sections I and II on the Winner Sticker (PPC-4). (Section I includes a signature line for parent or guardian consent.) Affix the sticker to the back, lower right-hand corner of the poster. Posters without the completed Winner Stickers will be disqualified. Reproductions of the sticker are not permitted.
- Take a photo of the winning poster for your club's publicity purposes, as well as to have a record of the student's artwork.
- To ensure that the poster arrives at the next level of judging in good condition, roll it and send it in a mailing tube. Do not fold the poster.
- Lions International Headquarters does not reimburse clubs for the cost of postage or shipping.
- Send the poster to your district governor for district judging. Entries
 must be postmarked on or before November 15, 2023. (If your
 club is not districted, forward the poster to Brand & Creative at
 International Headquarters by December 1, 2023.) Use express
 mail service when possible.
- Follow up with your district governor to make sure they received your club's poster. Winning entries submitted after the due date will be disqualified.

5. Recognize and Award Your Contest Winners

You'll find certificates for the club contest winner and participating school or youth group in this kit. Honorable mention certificates are available to print at lionsclubs.org/peaceposter.

Your club may offer additional prizes and even consider holding a special award ceremony during a club meeting or at the participating school or youth group location. If so, discuss this with the school or youth group contact. Artists of posters advancing to the final international judging are recognized as follows:

- International Grand Prize Winner receives a trip to an award ceremony where he or she will receive US\$5,000 (or local equivalent) and an award. Two family members (one being the winner's parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring Lions club president or a club member (as designated by club president) are invited to accompany the winner to the award ceremony.
- 23 Merit Award Winners will each receive US\$500 (or local equivalent) and a certificate of achievement.

6. Promote Your Contest Winner

Publicity brings recognition to your club, the school or youth group and participants. In addition, it creates community support and awareness of your club's activities.

 Raise awareness about the Peace Poster Contest and celebrate your contest winners on your social channels. Download social media graphics and customizable templates, Peace Contest Social Media Kits are available at lionsclubs.org/ peaceposter. Tag your posts! #peaceposter



 Prepare a press release on your club's letterhead announcing the winner. Download the Peace Poster Winner Press Release template at lionsclubs.org/peaceposter. Send a photograph of the contest winner and their winning poster with the press release to the editor/reporter of the features or community section of your local newspaper(s). Be sure to photograph the poster before advancing it to the next judging level. Keep a photograph for the club and student's records. If your club or the school is hosting a special award ceremony for the winner, work with your school contacts to invite your local media to attend.

- Update the media and your social channels if your club's entry advances to the multiple district or international judging levels.
- Make arrangements to exhibit the local contest entries in a public library, community center, festival or other public area.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost, misdirected or illegible entries. Entries sent with insufficient postage will be disqualified. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned. They become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. An international grand prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Lions International Peace Poster Contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International.




