Used Eyeglasses and the Minnesota Lions Missions, Inc: An Update

Where do the used eyeglasses go?

Have you ever wondered what happens to the used eyeglasses we Lions collect?

The easy answer is that they end up around the world enabling people to see, enjoy life, and be productive. The longer answer is:

- ◆ The 1st stop is the Minnesota Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Sauk Rapids, MN where the glasses are re-boxed and loaded into a trailer. When the trailer is full, as well as the pick-up truck that pulls it, (about 250,000 pairs of glasses), they are taken to the Wisconsin Eye Glass Recycling Center in Rosholt, WI.

Minnesota Lions have taken about 12 million pair of glasses to Wisconsin since they began counting.

- ◆ At the second stop in Rosholt, the glasses are sorted, reviewed for scratched lens, broken nose pads, etc., then packed in plastic see-through crates that are shrink-wrapped before being sent to area prisons for final processing.
- ◆ The third stop is one of three prisons in the Rosholt area where working with the used eyeglasses is the most sought-after job by the prisoners. They clean the glasses, record the prescription on plastic bags, and box the glasses.
- ◆ The glasses are returned to the Recycling Center and sorted and boxed by prescription before being sent to their final destination as

requested by various groups going on mission trips.

The Wisconsin Lions have made eyeglass mission trips to many countries for more than 25 years. In Feb. 2020, eight MN Lions joined 16 WI Lions on a mission trip to Chimaltenango, Guatemala and provided eyeglasses to 2,300 people.

The plan was to try to make annual mission trips, but COVID interfered. We did start the MN Lions Missions, Inc. for future trips. Our contacts in Guatemala advised us not to return in 2021, 2022, and 2023 due to COVID. They believe that 2024 should be safe. And a trip for Feb. 2024 is being planned.

We would like to have at least 15 Minnesota Lions go on this mission. If you have an interest, please contact me at dtmoen@q.com or PDG Jim Mulroy at lionjim0809@gmail.com for more information.

My personal takeaways from the 2020 trip are:

1. Our Lions motto is "We Serve" and a trip like this really hits the nail on the head.
2. You get to see a way of life - poverty - in a new perspective.
3. The people were very polite and thankful.
4. You can understand why they are willing to walk across Mexico and hope to get into the US

Energy Conservation is Priority for Amy and Skilled Home Companion Jackson

Amy has had multiple sclerosis since 2007, and in the past few years, her disability has become more progressive. “I get lightheaded sometimes when I bend to pick up things off the floor,” she explains. She also has difficult walking more than a few steps unassisted, and it’s not uncommon for her to fall or slip to the floor. “I did my best to keep my cell phone handy,” says Amy.

While Amy was working with her occupational therapist in 2021, the therapist suggested that she consider an assistance dog. Amy remembers thinking, “I wonder what a dog could do for me.” The answer: A lot.

Amy works entirely from home for her job, taking calls related to dental insurance claims, and doesn’t have much need to go out in public. Yet, she wished to be more self-sufficient at home.

Can Do Canines found the perfect homebody partner for her in Jackson, a black Lab that Amy describes as handsome, with jowls like an old man’s.

Their similar low-energy personalities work great together, also being in sync with Amy’s 14-year-old Shitzu, Flora. There is definitely no shortage of dog beds in Amy’s house. Family and friends helped welcome Jackson into the home with multiple beds: one for the living room, Amy’s office, and Jackson’s kennel. Although Jackson is more than happy to konk out on the kitchen floor, Amy says, “The humans in his life determined that he should not always be forced to.” Amy also jokes that he sometimes even tries to stake claim on Flora’s much smaller accommodations. “He’ll just get the idea in his head to curl up his 73-pound self and try to shoehorn himself into a bed for a 10-pound dog.”

Though Jackson doesn’t mind these relaxing moments of conserving his energy, helping Amy conserve her own energy is his top goal. Whether it’s bringing Amy’s walker to her, retrieving her shoes, tugging the laundry basket, or opening and closing doors, Jackson puts his Skilled Home Companion skills to good use for his companion in their home. Amy’s appreciation is palpable, especially as she shares, “He’s shown that he can apply his skills to different situations ... The “legs” command can be used to nudge my leg into the car, not just onto the bed.”

In addition, Jackson can make sure someone can be alerted to give Amy help when needed, pressing an appropriate button. “It’s a relief to know that he can do things to get attention if something happens,” Amy confirms. “It’s definitely another level of security.”

Amy only has one unfulfilled request of her furry friend. Having recently invested in a new hand-held vacuum, she jokes, “If he could just run that, it’d be great!”



Can Do Canines will host an open house on Saturday, March 4, from Noon-2 p.m., at its Can Do Canines campus (9440 Science Center Drive, New Hope, Minn.).

Potential clients, volunteers, or anyone who might be interested in supporting the organization are invited to attend to learn how an assistance dog changes the life of a person with a disability.

Through a self-guided tour, attendees will be able to watch a trainer working with an assistance dog, hear from a volunteer puppy raiser, talk with volunteer staff members, pose questions to client services coordinators about the application process, and meet graduate teams from each of the five types of areas Can Do Canines trains dogs: hearing, mobility, seizure, diabetes and childhood autism.

The assistance dog demonstrations will be held at 12:30, 1:00, and 1:30, and the puppy raiser will speak at 12:15, 12:45, and 1:15.

There is no pre-registration for this event, though attendees will be asked to share some contact information when arriving.




