## Writings from DG Paul

In preparing for my last cabinet meeting as district governor, I spent some time reviewing the goals I set at the beginning of the year. And thanks to you, we came close to achieving or surpassed most of the goals for the year and we had fun in the process.

Let me provide a snapshot goals and our accomplishments this year. They are as follows:

- Establish a web site that enhances our ability to communicate with our members and with the general public. The website needs some refinements, but it is up and running. We are also using the District Facebook Page to publicize events more than we have in the past.
- As a district, we will increase our reporting service hours in MyLion from 51% to 75% of our clubs by June 30, 2022. By my reckoning, LCI seems to be assuming that we have 40 clubs instead of 34. The reporting rate is 25/34, or a reporting rate of approximately 73.53%. Consequently, I consider this goal to be met.
- 3. By June 30, 2022, District 5M6 Lions will serve 160,000 people in their community (as reported in MyLion). Surpassed.
- 4. By the end of the 2021-2022 fiscal year, our district will achieve a positive membership growth (meet or exceed last year's membership numbers). Our team will charter 2 new clubs with 40 charter members. LCI required a specific breakdown of the goal, so this was listed going into the year: Fiscal Year New Members (100)+ Fiscal Year New Charter Members (40) Retention Goal (losing only 80 members) = Net Growth of Plus 60.

What we actually did was (145 +45 over goal) + New Charter Members (No charter members) -Dropped Members (102 - 22 over-)= Net Growth of Plus 43. We are seeing positive growth \from last year's totals and we have a Apple Valley Club that is moving towards being a charter Club.

## 5. By the end of the 2021-2022 fiscal year, District 5M6 will support LCIF Campaign 100 with 85% club participation and total 5M6 contributions of \$40,000. With two months left, we have doubled this goal.

6. We also had a training goals for Zone leaders (nearly met) and a separate one for club officers (which could be met at the upcoming ROAR college.

We also added a KidSight goal late in the process. We've seen an increase an increase in interest regarding vision screening. And in spite of COVID, we were able to screen kids in several key areas including the Apple Valley and Woodbury school districts. A quick shout-out to Woodbury—as they are the only club in District 5M-6 that currently conducting screening.

But there was also progress on other fronts.

I'm excited that the District held its first membership summit. Specifically, in April, approximately 45 Lions representing three districts and 26 clubs attended a summit that explored moving from a membership paradigm involving not based on traditional recruitment methods to one based on attraction. The summit also addressed new approaches to using Facebook and Facebook analytics to publicize new upcoming events.

I'm excited that local clubs have tried new service projects, projects such as Sleep in Heavenly Peace and Project Sole Hope.

I am also excited about the spirit of cooperation that is manifesting itself between Lions and other service organizations. I love how Lions Clubs (and in particular the St. Paul North Ramsey 500 Club) worked with major service Club organizations – Kiwanis International, Optimist International and Rotary International, as well as other groups, ranging from tackling hunger to cleaning up neighborhood parks.

This combination of fun, a new membership paradigm, better publicizing of club events, and a greater emphasis on pairing service projects with other service has paid off in dividends for the district.

District 5M-6 is approaching a net growth of 50 members this year. And even though there are two months left in my term, we have doubled our service hours and the number of people served from the previous year.


I appreciate having the opportunity to serve you as your district governor.

It has been a fantastic year, and I know that the DGE Pete Kelzenberg will keep continue expanding our membership base.


I know that by working together, we can continue the momentum that has manifested itself in the District this year and we can meet all challenges ahead of us!

### FOOD TRUCKS/TRAILERS

Last year, we introduced food trucks/trailers and they were a huge hit! People wanted to see more food trucks/trailers this year. We want to invite other Lions Clubs in 5M-6 to sell food and raise money for their clubs. More information about being a food vendor is at the link below.

### VENDORS

Clubs that have items to sell are encouraged to become vendors. Vendors have 10' x 10' of space to sell items and/or raise awareness about their organization. Think, too, about other environmentally-themed activities you could do, such as doing a plant or bulb fundraiser for your club, showing a variety of native plants and shrubs to help pollinators and wildlife, etc.

### HANDS-ON ACTIVITIES

This year's theme is "Go Green" which fits perfectly with the Lions' global cause of the Environment. We are looking for hands-on activities that visitors can do while they are at Taco Daze. There are people of all ages - children to seniors. Your hands-on activity could be anything environmentally-related: doing upcycled arts/crafts projects, having displays about different environmental subjects (e.g., helping pollinators, planting trees, recycling, upcycling, reusing), sustainable fashion, a scavenger hunt to win a prize, or perhaps work with a wildlife organization to have a raptor or other birds/animals at your booth.

### SERVICE PROJECT/ACTIVITY

If your club participates in Taco Daze and does anything related to one (or more) of the global causes (Diabetes, Environment, Hunger, Pediatric Cancer, and Vision) - you can count that towards your club's service projects/activities for 2022-23! This is an easy - and fun - way to reach literally thousands of people!

### SIGN UP SOON!!

Space for vendors and food trucks/trailers is on a first-come, first-served basis. Last year, we had to turn people away from both the vendor area and food truck/trailer area. #### COST

1.The cost of a vendor booth (with 10 frontage feet) is \$60 and the cost for the farmers' market is \$30. The fee for non-profits that are selling items is \$60 and for those not selling items it is free. Vendors are welcome to purchase two booth spaces for \$120 (\$60 for the farmers' market).

2. There are spots for six food trucks/trailers. The fee is \$125.

3. There are a limited number of spaces available for vendors and food trucks; and they are filled on a first-come, first-served basis. If you know you want to participate in Taco Daze, please submit your application right away.

## **2023 International Dues Adjustment:** Frequently Asked Questions

### Why was an international dues adjustment proposed?

In recent years, it has become clear that our current international dues are not sufficient to meet our rising costs. We are currently operating in a budget deficit, and it will continue to increase as inflation and the cost of doing business increase.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust international dues.

### What is the proposed international dues adjustment?

The proposed dues adjustment includes a \$7 increase to the current \$43 international dues, spread out over three years. Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

### When were international dues last adjusted?

International dues have not been adjusted in 10 years even though annual inflation has been increasing the cost of operations required to do business around the world.

### How do Lions Clubs International dues compare to other service organizations?

Currently, Rotary International dues are \$70 per year. Kiwanis International charges \$60 per year for most countries, which includes an \$8 premium to receive their magazine.

### What are international dues currently used for?

Lions Clubs International is a global organization that supports more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of Lions International staff and programs, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources and programs, training events and software, club operational support, international convention and meetings, language services in 14 languages, technology and digital products, global marketing, PR and advertising, leadership support, and legal support and liability insurance.

### How will the funds be used if the international dues adjustment is passed?

A dues adjustment will help bridge the current deficit and ensure our association continues to invest in programs, initiatives and technologies that enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

## **2023 International Dues Adjustment:** Frequently Asked Questions

## Who will decide whether or not international dues will be adjusted?

The International Board of Directors approved a resolution to adjust international dues. The proposal will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention by the official convention delegates. If the resolution is passed, the change will take place on July 1, 2023.

## Has Lions International taken steps to reduce expenses?

Lions Clubs International completed a rigorous financial review and took the following steps to reduce expenses:

- Operating budgets were reduced.
- Vendor contracts were renegotiated to yield savings.
- Programs were cut after thorough review and consideration of value to members and return on investment (ROI).
- International staff was reduced in 2020 to align costs and revenue during the COVID-19 pandemic.

## Will this change my local club dues?

The adjustment to international dues is independent of your club, district or multiple-district membership dues. It is up to each club, district and multiple district to establish dues that allow them to operate and serve as needed in their communities

## **Attend the Rodeo and Fight Cancer**



Outside of competition, there will be entertainment in Victory Village, health screenings for athletes, Celebration Ceremonies, and many other activities for everyone! Summer Games is open to the public and family friendly!

The Lions have played a major part in this competition for many years, and will once again host the Opening Eyes screening. As part of the Healthy Athletes program offerings, Opening Eyes provides a complete eye exam, conducted by eye doctors and eye care professionals. ### 2022 YCE Program in Minnesota USA Guidelines

Unfortunately, Covid-19 continues to play a major role in the World, and the situation must be considered when planning the YCE Programme for 2022.

We will be requiring documentation for full Covid-19 vaccination of all YCE Students together with a negative test when entering the United States.

Camp Officials and Host Families will need to be vaccinated in accordance with the national vaccination program, approved by the CDC, in the United States.

These difficult decisions have been made in cooperation with other countries, taking part in Youth Exchange Program in 2022, and we hope that this situation will return to normal in 2023, allowing the YCE Program will be able to be held as before.

## A Herding Dog and His Hearing Job

Training her fourth successful successor assistance dog has been an adventure for Becky Thomas, who was partnered with three dogs from Can Do Canines before Jasper came into her life.


It all started back in the early 2000s. Becky's father had been a Lion in Ham Lake, and the club had done some fundraising for Can Do Canines. Having learned about their assistance dogs, he suggested that Becky apply for a Hearing Assist Dog, and her journey began!

Jasper, now a 5-year-old miniature Australian Shepherd, has been with Becky since he was 12 weeks old. Becky loved her previous Hearing Assist Dog, a mini-Aussie named Caremyl, so she purchased Jasper from the same breeder who had donated Caremyl to Can Do Canines. Her goal to train him as a Hearing Assist Dog worked perfectly because Jasper joined the family as his female predecessor was easing into retirement. Jasper watched Caremyl's alert work and would copy her behaviors, eventually taking over the job while she napped.

Becky continued training with him to sharpen his assistance dog behavioral and public skills. After years of an evolving assistance dog experience with the organization, Becky was still nervous about being accepted with Jasper because she knew it took work to succeed as an owner-provided team. Since training questions or behavioral issues arise throughout the lifetime of a team, she shares, "It's nice to have somebody to rely on. Just knowing the organization is still there after graduation really helps."

Becky grew up hard of hearing until she was about 21, when she lost most of her hearing. Even though she was accepting of the change, she got frustrated with missing important sounds, and she felt her independence slipping away. Her first Can Do Canines dog was placed while she was living alone and had to use a lot of unreliable adaptive equipment. Now, she has a family that she gets to take care of rather than depending on them to communicate environmental noises to her, thanks to Jasper's enthusiastic alert skills.

Becky calls Jasper her "wild child" and loves seeing his lightbulb moments when he gets a behavior right. She says, "I enjoy the challenge of his high energy because it makes me grow as a trainer." Jasper alerts Becky to the microwave, the phone, a knock at the door, the smoke alarm, her children when they call her



name, and a falling item. After prompting her with the touch of his paw, he rushes to the source of the sound to let her know what needs attention.

Becky's family and friends are so happy for Jasper to be a part of her world, helping to expand it for her. She also feels "more included and safe" thanks to his vigilant presence. He's even been alerting to new sounds they had not trained for, and she didn't know existed until he responded to the noise. She explains, "[Jasper] fills in that puzzle for me."
